

World Day of Communion

On World Day of Communion several women in the congregation presented breads from around the world. These breads were then shared during the Service. Pita, made by Trina Brown and presented by Lana Humphrey; Chinese Almond, made and presented by Ginger Morris; Kolach Bread, made and presented by Nancy Godfrey; Banana Bread, made and presented by Leah Fihe, and Quick Bread, made and presented by Wilma Humphrey. As each bread was presented, Worship Committee Chair Trina Brown, described the bread using the litany below.

Presentation of the Breads

These breads are symbols of the many different peoples within the family of God.

Pita Bread – Africa and the Middle East:

We offer this pita bread in honor of the people of Africa and the Middle East. May we remember Africa's people, who struggle with poverty, drought, famine, disease, and civil war. May we remember the people of the Middle East, who have been striving for so long for peace and have not given up hope.

Chinese Almond Bread – Asia:

We offer this Chinese almond bread in honor of the people of Asia. May we remember the people of China, where the number of Christians is growing at a rate of several million annually despite increasing government repression. May we remember the flood victims in the Philippines and the earthquake victims in Indonesia.

Kolach Bread – Europe:

We offer this Kolach Bread, a bread from Bulgaria, in honor of the people of Europe. May we remember Christians in this increasingly secular region, where great cathedrals stand empty on most days, filled with more tourists than worshipers.

Banana Bread – Latin America and the Caribbean:

We offer this Banana Bread in honor of the people of Latin America and the Caribbean. May we remember those who face incredible challenges with violence, poverty, civil unrest, and food shortages.

Quick Bread – North America:

We offer this Quick Bread in honor of the people of North America, and more specifically, Salem, Indiana. May we remember that as we live and work in this place, we are called to live responsibly within God's world and in harmony with God's people.

Ecumenical Observance Began in 1936

World Communion Sunday (originally called World Wide Communion Sunday) originated in the Presbyterian Church (USA). In 1936, for the first time, the first Sunday in October was celebrated in Presbyterian churches in the United States and overseas. From the beginning, it was planned so that other denominations could make use of it and, after a few years, the idea spread beyond the Presbyterian Church.

The Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) was first associated with World Wide Communion Sunday in 1940 when the department's executive secretary, Jesse Bader, led in its extension to a number of churches throughout the world.

Today, efforts to promote World Communion Sunday are carried out by participating denominations, and several produce materials geared toward this observance. Please contact your denomination's national offices to inquire about the availability of such materials.

Hanover College Homecoming 2009

When Carolyn, Evelyn, and I arrived at Hanover College for Homecoming, Saturday, October 3, it appeared that everyone who ever attended Hanover College was there. There were cars in all the parking lots and streets. Luckily, we found the one that was left. Why were we there? Because I was celebrating with the 1939 graduates. It was my 70th reunion. I have been to a number of reunions and homecomings but this one was special. My son Brian was there also. He was celebrating his 35th. Five years ago there were 8 of us present for the 65th. Saturday there were 5. Somewhat surprising is that 4 of us were Physical Education Majors. Two of us are in the Athletic Hall of Fame. As we were driving around the Campus, we passed the place where you can look across the hills and see the Ohio River. I said there were famous paintings of that scene. Carolyn Lyles said she couldn't paint, so she took a picture of it. During Stewardship Week you have heard me mention Hanover College and our Church's relationship with it. At the Alumni Luncheon, President Sue DeWine spoke about the "affordability" of Hanover. During our '39 reception and photo session Dr. DeWine came by and talked to us as she did with the other alums having reunions. I could not write this without mentioning what it was like 70 years ago. When I was a student, the enrollment was about 350 with a staff of 26. Today there are more than 1000 students and approximately 200 faculty and staff members. When I was a student we listened to the music of Glenn Miller and Benny Goodman, danced to "Big Apple," read "Gone With the Wind," and went to the movies to see Cary Grant or Spencer Tracy. Nor could I write about Hanover without mentioning that today there is excitement and opportunity there. My friends and I experienced that at our reunion. And as we said our goodbyes, Bobby would be going back to Boston, Marty to Cincinnati, Margaret, Peg, and I are Hoosiers. As we left, Marty said she wouldn't come back for our 75th. We said we would miss her.

On October 3rd my sister, Evelyn Lyles, and I had the pleasure of accompanying Carolyn Haag to Hanover College for the 2009 Homecoming. The Campus was alive with many activities for all the returning Hanoverians. Tents were set up at various places with pamphlets and maps that had information about where different events were being held. It was a very exciting day for my friend Carolyn Haag, who shared many stories of her time on the campus and being able to see the Sorority House where she once lived as a student . We went to a location on campus where there was a deep ravine that provided a breathtaking view of the Ohio River.
